CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

Distinguished Shareholders, Fellow Directors, and Management Team

With a great sense of joy, pride and privilege, I welcome everyone on behalf of the Board of Directors to this 62nd Annual General Meeting of GLANVILL ENTHOVEN INSURANCE BROKERS & PENSIONS CONSULTANTS LIMITED (Glanvills). I am delighted to present the Annual report and Accounts of Glanvills for the year ended 31st December, 2019 to the Board. It was a positive year. With sweat and struggle, I enjoyed being part of the dynamic team at Glanvills. This is a business that has good foundations, a strong heritage and it is a market leader. The new strategy of the management has leveraged these strengths and it has yielded result as disclosed herein below:

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE:

While boards and management hold close ties to one another, their duties and responsibilities are distinctly different. The Board of Glanvills is an organized group of non-executive directors with the collective authority to control and foster an institution that is administered by executive and staff. The laws impose fiduciary responsibilities on the Board members and there are penalties for members' failure to provide appropriate and legal oversight. Consequently, Board members are ultimately held responsible and thus need to be informed of how the organization is being managed to protect their legal responsibilities. As the Chairman of the Board, I led the board in keeping with the organization's vision, mission, and strategic planning goals. The laws clearly state that the Directors are responsible for the preparation of financial statements which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company at the end of the financial year in compliance with the requirements of Companies & Allied Matter Act Cap C20LFN 2004. Since the laws state that the delegation of any duty or authority to the Management does not in any way diminish the overall responsibility of the Board and its directors are accountable and responsible for the affairs and performance of the company, we are duty bound to enforce every aspect of the laws, accounting and auditing standards in the interest of the Shareholders.

ECONOMIC OVERVIEW OF INDICATIONS AND BUSINESS OPERATING ENVIRONMENT:

There are some indicators that have affected the Nigeria economic in the year 2019 which invariably had also had major impact on insurance business in general; these are (a) devaluation of Nigeria currency thereby causing many businesses to retrench many of its staff with other winding up. (b) None passing relevant bills on insurance industry at National Assembly which makes it difficult to plugged the fraudulent claims in the market. (c) Too much conflict issues on tax burden imposed on insurance industry. (d) Shrinking/Lean economy which leads to unemployment which reduces life Assurance and contributory pension. (e) Government in both states and Federal level not spending premium to cover national and state assets against unforeseen risks of partial or total loss.

OPERATING RESULTS:

Glanvills delivered a year of record income of N46.9m compared to the loss of (N50.3m) in 2018. The gross brokerage income earned during the year 2019 amounted to N264.4m compared to N180.6m in 2018 and

increase of 48%. The net brokerage income equally increased by 49% from N175,407m in 2018 to N261,725m in 2019. Investment Income in 2019 was N6.9m compared to N9.6 in 2018, a decrease of 72%. It is the Board's desire that the increase in the earning of income be sustained and surpassed.

GLANVILLS TODAY:

Eminent Shareholders, Glanvills' staff have helped to develop and grow the Company into the enterprise it is today, one that is focused on exceeding customers' expectations and maximizing shareholders' wealth. The Management is working on improving its cordial relationship with the Board to be able to take Glanvills to a higher height.

GLANVILLS TOMORROW:

Glanvills has increased its efforts to obtain Micro-Insurance license to be able to begin operation hopefully before the end of Year 2020 and has also built manpower capacity to transact other classes of business such as Agriculture, Oil & Gas, Marine and Aviation in order to boost our income beyond 2020. The Board cannot gloss over the impact of Covid-19 pandemic on our income. The impact would be both negative and positive; in the sense that almost all our clients lost income, with consequence on premium payable on their risks. However, the Company devised introduction of other classes of insurance such as medical/health and travel to our clients due to the prevalence of health risks associated with the pandemic. Furthermore, Glanvills plans to leverage on any improving market conditions and pursue strong organic growth. We will continue to identify exciting opportunities for significant growth through market extension within the Oil, Gas and Mining industry. As the world evolves, so do the needs of those we serve. In order to strive to do better, we must and we will respond with an agile yet resilient business action.

CONCLUSION:

I take this opportunity to acknowledge and place on record my sincere appreciation & gratitude to our loyal customers for their continued patronage and our management and staff led by Mr. Supo Falana for their commendable teamwork, positive attitude, dedication to duty, untiring efforts and, their continuous passion that puts us ahead of the market. I want to especially praise the efforts of our Information Technology (IT) section led by Mr. Sesan Oyeleye for being a pathfinder and for his unprecedented achievements. My gratitude to fellow Board members for their pro-active guidance and valuable inputs. To this end, I would like to express a profound appreciation to our founding founders for their vision with the desire and prayer that those of us currently serving would water their efforts to enable us leave a sound and better investment for posterity. It is in this regard that I appeal to everyone to endure my perceived occasional irritation for a better Glanvills to eschew the regret of our forefathers in the grave. 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BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE CONSOLIDATED AND SEPARATE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

BASIS OF PREPARATION

1 Reporting Entity

Glanvill Enthoven Insurance Brokers & Pension Consultants Limited is incorporated in Nigeria under the Companies and Allied Matters Act as a private limited liability company, and is domiciled in Nigeria. The address of its registered office is 174, Funso Williams Avenue, Costain, Surulere Lagos. The Company is principally engaged in the provision of insurance and reinsurance intermediation, risk management, claims and similar advisory services, advancing of funds to their clients and advancing of funds to insurance companies.

The Company's activities are subject to the regulations of National Insurance Commission. In accordance with Insurance Acts 2013, the following are the fiduciary duties of an insurance brokers.

Section 40(1) - An insurance broker shall establish and maintain at all times a Client's accounts into which all monies, premiums, claims and recoveries from and on behalf of clients, insurers and reinsurer shall be paid.

Section 41(1) - Where an insurance business is transacted through an insurance broker, the insurance broker shall, not later than 30 days of collecting the premium paid, pay the insurers the premium collected by him.

Section 41(2) - An insurance broker who contravenes the provisions of subsection (1) of this section commits an offence and is liable on a conviction as-

- (a) a first offence, to a fine of N10, 000 or 5 times the value of the premium whichever is greater;
- (b) a second offence, to a fine of N25,000 or to 10 times the value of the premium whichever is greater; or a third offence, to a fine of N250,000 and in addition, the certificate of the insurance broker shall be
- (c) called and the persons or in the case of a firm, the persons constituting the firm or directors of the company shall be disqualified from being again involved in the setting up of the business of insurance brokage under this Act either by himself or themselves or in conjunction with any other persons or body.
 - Section 42(1) An insurance broker shall keep records of all insurance business handled by him and, for the purposes of this section, separate records shall be kept by the broker with respect to-
- (a) insurance business entered into with insurers registered under or pursuant to this Act; and
- (b) subject to subsection (3) of this section (see below), insurance business entered into with persons outside Nigeria.

- (a) keep accounting records which shall show and explain the business transacted by the insurance broker and to disclose his true financial position; and
- (b) ensure that the accounting records kept under paragraph (a) of this subsection give a true and fair view of his business at the accounting date.
 - Section 42(3) An insurance broker shall submit an audited statement of account comprising-
- (a) (a) revenue
- (b) (b) the profit and loss account
- (c) balance sheet in the prescribed form to the Commission not later than 6 months after the accounting date.

2 BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

(a) Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with, and comply with, International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and in the manner required by the Companies and Allied Matters Act of Nigeria, the Financial Reporting Council of Nigeria Act, 2011, the Insurance Act of Nigeria and the relevant National Insurance Commission (NAICOM) guidelines and circulars, to the extent that they do not conflict with the requirements of IFRS.

Selected explanatory notes are included to explain events and transactions that are significant to an understanding of the changes in financial position and performance of the Company since the last annual financial statements as at and for the year ended 31 December 2019.

This is the first financial statement where IFRS 9 and IFRS 15 have been applied due to the directive issued by the National Insurance Commission (NAICOM), dated 2 May 2019, which mandated all insurance brokers in Nigeria to defer the adoption of IFRS 9 and IFRS 15 until 1 January 2019.

(b) Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for the following in the statement of financial position:

- financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value
- available-for-sale financial assets are measured at fair value (applicable before 1 January 2018)
- financial assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (applicable from 1 January 2018)
- liabilities for cash-settled share-based payment arrangements are measured at fair value.

 The Company applies accrual accounting for recognition of its income and expenses.

(c) Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in naira, which is the Company's functional currency; except where indicated, financial information presented in Naira has been rounded to the nearest thousand.

(d) Use of judgements and estimates

In preparing the financial statements, the Company makes judgement, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses within the current and subsequent financial years. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to estimates are Information about significant areas of estimation uncertainty and critical judgments in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognized in the financial statements are described in note to the financial statements.

(g) Presentation of Financial Statement in Accordance with IAS1

The consolidated financial statement are presented in accordance with IAS 1 Presentation of financial statements. The group has elected to present a single statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

(h) Basis of Consolidation

The group financial statement involves consolidating those of the parent and its one (1) subsidiary undertakings drawn up to 31 December, 2019.

The subsidiaries are entities over which parent has power to control the financial and operating policies. The company obtain an exclusive control through more than half of the voting rights of its subsidiaries. The subsidiaries have a reporting date of 31 December.

(3) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied by the Company in presenting the financial statements.

(a) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash balances and call deposits with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition that are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in their fair value, and are used by the Company in the management of its short term commitments

Bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the Company's cash management are included as a component of cash and cash equivalents for the purposes of the statement of cash flows.

(b) Financial Instruments

(i) Recognition and Initial measurement

Trade receivables and debt securities issued are initially recognised when they are originated. All other financial assets and financial liabilities are initially recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

A financial asset (unless it is a trade receivable without a significant financing component) or financial liability is initially measured at fair value plus, for an item not at FVTPL, transaction costs that are directly attributable to its acquisition or issue. A trade receivable without a significant financing component is initially measured at the transaction price.

(ii) Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial assets - Policy applicable from 1 January 2019

On initial recognition, a financial asset is classified as measured at: amortised cost; FVOCI - debt investment; FVOCI - equity investment; or FVTPL.

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BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE CONSOLIDATED AND SEPARATE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019 (CONT'D)

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets, in which case all affected financial assets are reclassified on the first day of the first reporting period following the change in the business model.

A financial asset is measured at amortised cost if it meets both of the following conditions and is not designated as at FVTPL:

- -- it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- -- its contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

A debt investment is measured at FVOCI if it meets both of the following conditions and is not designated as at FVTPL:

- -- it is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets; and
- -- its contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding

On initial recognition of an equity investment that is not held for trading, the Company may irrevocably elect to present subsequent changes in the investment's fair value in OCI. This election is made on an investment-by-investment basis

All financial assets not classified as measured at amortised cost or FVOCI as described above are measured at FVTPL. On initial recognition, the Company may irrevocably designate a financial asset that otherwise meets the requirements to be measured at amortised cost or at FVOCI as at FVTPL if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces an accounting mismatch that would otherwise arise.

Financial assets - Business model assessment: Policy applicable from 1 January 2019

The Company makes an assessment of the objective of the business model in which a financial asset is held at a portfolio level because this best reflects the way the business is managed and information is provided to management. The information considered includes:

- -- the stated policies and objectives for the portfolio and the operation of those policies in practice. These include whether management's strategy focuses on earning contractual interest income, maintaining a particular interest rate profile, matching the duration of the financial assets to the duration of any related liabilities or expected cash outflows or realising cash flows through the sale of the assets;
- -- how the performance of the portfolio is evaluated and reported to the Company's management;
- -- the risks that affect the performance of the business model (and the financial assets held within that business model) and how those risks are managed;
- -- how managers of the business are compensated e.g. whether compensation is based on the fair value of the assets managed or the contractual cash flows collected; and
- -- the frequency, volume and timing of sales of financial assets in prior periods, the reasons for such sales and expectations about future sales activity.

Transfers of financial assets to third parties in transactions that do not qualify for derecognition are not considered sales for this purpose, consistent with the Company's continuing recognition of the assets.

Financial assets that are held for trading or are managed and whose performance is evaluated on a fair value basis are measured at FVTPL.

Financial assets - Assessment whether contractual cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest

For the purposes of this assessment, 'principal' is defined as the fair value of the financial asset on initial recognition. 'Interest' is defined as consideration for the time value of money and for the credit risk associated with the principal amount outstanding during a particular period of time and for other basic lending risks and costs (e.g. liquidity risk and administrative costs), as well as a profit margin.

In assessing whether the contractual cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest, the Company considers the contractual terms of the instrument. This includes assessing whether the financial asset contains a contractual term that could change the timing or amount of contractual cash flows such that it would not meet this condition. In making this assessment, the Company considers:

- -- contingent events that would change the amount or timing of cash flows;
- -- terms that may adjust the contractual coupon rate, including variable-rate features;
- -- prepayment and extension features; and
- -- terms that limit the Company's claim to cash flows from specified assets (e.g. non-recourse features).

A prepayment feature is consistent with the solely payments of principal and interest criterion if the prepayment amount substantially represents unpaid amounts of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding, which may include reasonable compensation for early termination of the contract. Additionally, for a financial asset acquired at a discount or premium to its contractual par amount, a feature that permits or requires prepayment at an amount that substantially represents the contractual par amount plus accrued (but unpaid) contractual interest (which may also include reasonable compensation for early termination) is treated as consistent with this criterion if the fair value of the prepayment feature is insignificant at initial recognition.

Financial liabilities are classified as measured at amortised cost or FVTPL. A financial liability is classified as at FVTPL if it is classified as held-for-trading, it is a derivative or it is designated as such on initial recognition. Financial liabilities at FVTPL are measured at fair value and net gains and losses, including any interest expense, are recognised in profit or loss. Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss. Any gain or loss on derecognition is also recognised in profit or loss.

(iii) Derecognition

The company derecognises a financial asset when the contractual right to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all of the risk and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred or in which the Company neither transfers nor retains substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership and it does not retain control of the financial asset.

The Company enters into transactions whereby it transfers assets recognised in its statement of financial position, but retains either all or substantially all of the risks and rewards of the transferred assets. In these cases, the transferred assets are not derecognised.

Financial liabilities

The Company derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled, or expire. The Company also derecognises a financial liability when its terms are modified and the cash flows of the modified liability are substantially different, in which case a new financial liability based on the modified terms is recognised at fair value.

On derecognition of a financial liability, the difference between the carrying amount extinguished and the consideration paid (including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed) is recognised in profit or loss.

(iv) Offsetting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Company currently has a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and it intends either to settle them on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

(v) The concept of fair value measurement and amortised cost

Fair value measurement

'Fair value' is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date in the principal or, in its absence, the most advantageous market to which the Company has access at that date. The fair value of a liability reflects its non-performance risk.

When available, the Company measures the fair value of an instrument using the quoted price in an active market for that instrument. A market is regarded as 'active' if transactions for the asset or liability take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

If there is no quoted price in an active market, then the Company uses valuation techniques that maximise the use of relevant observable inputs and minimise the use of unobservable inputs. The chosen valuation technique incorporates all of the factors that market participants would take into account in pricing a transaction.

If an asset or a liability measured at fair value has a bid price and an ask price, then the Company measures assets and long positions at a bid price and liabilities and short positions at an ask price.

The best evidence of the fair value of a financial instrument on initial recognition is normally the transaction price - i.e. the fair value of the consideration given or received. If the Company determines that the fair value on initial recognition differs from the transaction price and the fair value is evidenced neither by a quoted price in an active market for an identical asset or liability nor based on a valuation technique for which any unobservable inputs are judged to be insignificant in relation to the measurement, then the financial instrument is initially measured at fair value, adjusted to defer the difference between the fair value on initial recognition and the transaction price. Subsequently, that difference is recognised in profit or loss on an appropriate basis over the life of the instrument but no later than when the valuation is wholly supported by observable market data or the transaction is closed out.

Amortised cost measurement

The amortised cost of a financial asset or liability is the amount at which the financial asset or liability is measured at initial recognition, minus principal repayments, plus or minus the cumulative amortisation using the effective interest method of any difference between the initial amount recognised and the maturity amount, minus any reduction for impairment.

Effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset or a financial liability and of allocating the interest income or interest expense over the relevant period.

(c) Impairment

(i) Non-derivative financial assets

Policy applicable from 1 January 2019

Financial instruments and contract assets

The Company recognises loss allowances for ECLs on:

financial assets measured at amortised cost;

debt investments measured at FVOCI; and

contract assets.

The Company measures loss allowances at an amount equal to lifetime ECLs, except for the following, which are measured at 12-month ECLs:

- debt securities that are determined to have low credit risk at the reporting date; and
- other debt securities and bank balances for which credit risk (i.e. the risk of default occurring over the expected life of the financial instrument) has not increased significantly since initial recognition.

Loss allowances for trade receivables and contract assets are always measured at an amount equal to lifetime ECLs.

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating ECLs, the Company considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis, based on the Company's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward-looking information.

The Company assumes that the credit risk on a financial asset has increased significantly if it is more than 365 days past due.

The Company considers a financial asset to be in default when:

- the borrower is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Company in full, without recourse by the Company to actions such as realising security (if any is held); or
- the financial asset is more than 90 days past due.

The Company considers a debt security to have low credit risk when its credit risk rating is equivalent to the globally understood definition of 'investment grade'. The Company considers this to be between AAA and BBB per Fitch, Standard & Poor's, and Global Credit Rating.

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BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE CONSOLIDATED AND SEPARATE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019 (CONT'D)

Lifetime ECLs are the ECLs that result from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial instrument.

12-month ECLs are the portion of ECLs that result from default events that are possible within the 12 months after the reporting date (or a shorter period if the expected life of the instrument is less than 12 months).

The maximum period considered when estimating ECLs is the maximum contractual period over which the Company is exposed to credit risk.

Measurement of ECLs

ECLs are a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses. Credit losses are measured as the present value of all cash shortfalls (i.e. the difference between the cash flows due to the entity in accordance with the contract and the cash flows that the Company expects to receive).

ECLs are discounted at the effective interest rate of the financial asset.

Credit-impaired financial assets

At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether financial assets carried at amortised cost and debt securities at FVOCI are credit-impaired. A financial asset is 'credit-impaired' when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset have occurred Evidence that a financial asset is credit-impaired includes the following observable data:

- significant financial difficulty of the borrower or issuer;
- a breach of contract such as a default or being more than 90 days past due;
- the restructuring of a loan or advance by the Company on terms that the Company would not consider otherwise;
- it is probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; or
- the disappearance of an active market for a security because of financial difficulties.

Presentation of allowance for ECL in the statement of financial position

Loss allowances for financial assets measured at amortised cost are deducted from the gross carrying amount of the assets.

For debt securities at FVOCI, the loss allowance is charged to profit or loss and is recognised in OCI.

Write-off

The gross carrying amount of a financial asset is written off when the Company has no reasonable expectations of recovering a financial asset in its entirety or a portion thereof. For corporate customers, the Company individually makes an assessment with respect to the timing and amount of write-off based on whether there is a reasonable expectation of recovery. The Company expects no significant recovery from the amount written off. However, financial assets that are written off could still be subject to enforcement activities in order to comply with the Company's procedures for recovery of amounts due.

Policy applicable before 1 January 2018

Non-derivative financial assets

Financial assets not classified as at FVTPL were assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there was objective evidence of impairment.

Objective evidence that financial assets were impaired included: default or delinquency by a debtor;

restructuring of an amount due to the Company on terms that the Company would not consider otherwise; indications that a debtor or issuer would enter bankruptcy;

adverse changes in the payment status of borrowers or issuers;

the disappearance of an active market for a security because of financial difficulties; or

observable data indicating that there was a measurable decrease in the expected cash flows from a Company of financial assets.

For an investment in an equity instrument, objective evidence of impairment included a significant or prolonged decline in its fair value below its cost. The Company considered a decline of 20% to be significant and a period of nine months to be prolonged.

Financial assets measured at amortised cost

The Company considered evidence of impairment for these assets at both an individual asset and a collective level. All individually significant assets were individually assessed for impairment. Those found not to be impaired were then collectively assessed for any impairment that had been incurred but not yet individually identified. Assets that were not individually significant were collectively assessed for impairment. Collective assessment was carried out by Companying together assets with similar risk characteristics

In assessing collective impairment, the Company used historical information on the timing of recoveries and the amount of loss incurred, and made an adjustment if current economic and credit conditions were such that the actual losses were likely to be greater or lesser than suggested by historical trends.

An impairment loss was calculated as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. Losses were recognised in profit or loss and reflected in an allowance account. When the Company considered that there were no realistic prospects of recovery of the asset, the relevant amounts were written off. If the amount of impairment loss subsequently decreased and the decrease was related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, then the previously recognised

financial assets

Available-for-sale Impairment losses on available-for-sale financial assets were recognised by reclassifying the losses accumulated in the fair value reserve to profit or loss. The amount reclassified was the difference between the acquisition cost (net of any principal repayment and amortisation) and the current fair value, less any impairment loss previously recognised in profit or loss. If the fair value of an impaired available-for-sale debt security subsequently increased and the increase was related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised, then the impairment loss was reversed through profit or loss. Impairment losses recognised in profit or loss for an investment in an equity instrument classified as available-for-sale were not reversed through profit or loss.

(ii) Non-financial assets

At each reporting date, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its non-financial assets (other than biological assets, investment property, inventories and deferred tax assets) to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. Goodwill is tested annually for impairment.

For impairment testing, assets are grouped together into the smallest group of assets that generates cash inflows from continuing use that are largely independent of the cash inflows of other assets or CGUs. Goodwill arising from a business combination is allocated to CGUs or groups of CGUs that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the greater of its value in use and its fair value less costs to sell. Value in use is based on the estimated future cash flows, discounted to their present value using a pretax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset or CGU.

An impairment loss is recognised if the carrying amount of an asset or CGU exceeds its recoverable amount.

Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss. They are allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the CGU, and then to reduce the carrying amounts of the other assets in the CGU on a pro rata basis.

An impairment loss in respect of goodwill is not reversed. For other assets, an impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised.

(d) Other receivables and prepayments

Other receivables and prepayments are carried at amortised cost less any accumulated impairment losses. Prepayments are recognised as payment is made and subsequently amortised on a straight-line basis over the tenor of payment.

(e) Investment in associates and joint ventures

Associates are entities, including an unincorporated entity such as partnership, over which the Company has significant influence and that is neither a subsidiary nor an interest in a joint venture.

A joint venture is a joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement have the right to the net assets of the arrangement. Furthermore, a joint control is the contractually agreed sharing comtrol of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require the unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

Associates and joint ventures are accounted for using the equity method of accounting. Under the equity method, the investment is initially recognised at cost and adjusted thereafter for the post-acquisition change in the investor's share of comprehensive income of the associate. On acquisition of the investment, any difference between the cost of the investment and the investor 's share of the net fair value of the associate's identifiable assets, liabilities and contigent liabilities is accounted for in accordance with IFRS 3 Business Combinations. The goodwill (net of any accumulated impairment loss) relating to an investment in an associate is included within the carrying amount of that investment.

The Company's share of its associates' and joint ventures' post-acquisition profits or losses is recognised in the income statement, and its share of the post-acquisition movements in the other comprehensive income is recognised in the other comprehensive income. The cumulative post-acquistion movements are adjusted against the carrying amount of the investment.

Distributions received from an investee reduce the carrying amount of the investment

If the Company's share of losses of an associate and joint venture equals or exceeds its interest in the associate, the Company does not provide for additional losses, unless it has incurred obligations or made payments on behalf of the associate.

Profits on Company transactions with associates are eliminated to the extent of the Company's interest in the relevant associate and joint venture whereas balances arising from unsetteled trading transactions with associates are not eliminated.

Other long term interest in associate such as preference share, long term receivables and loans for which settlement is neither planned or likely in the foreseeable future are included in the Company's net investment in the associate.

(f) Leases

The Company has applied IFRS 16 using the modified retrospective approach and therefore the comparative information has not been restated and continues to be reported under IAS 17 and IFRIC 4. The details of accounting policies under IAS 17 and IFRIC 4 are disclosed separately.

Policy applicable from 1 January 2019

At inception of a contract, the Company assesses whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. To assess whether a contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, the Company uses

the definition of a lease in IFRS 16.

This policy is applied to contracts entered into, on or after 1 January 2019.

(i) As a lessee

At commencement or on modification of a contract that contains a lease component, the Company allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of its relative stand-alone prices. However, for the leases of property the Company has elected not to separate non-lease components and account for the lease and non-lease components as a single lease component.

The Company recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located, less any lease incentives received.

The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term, unless the lease transfers ownership of the underlying asset to the Company by the end of the lease term or the cost of the right-of-use asset reflects that the Company will exercise a purchase option. In that case the right-of-use asset will be depreciated over the useful life of the underlying asset, which is determined on the same basis as those of property and equipment. In addition, the right-of-use asset is periodically reduced by impairment losses, if any, and adjusted for certain remeasurements of the lease liability.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the Company's incremental borrowing rate. Generally, the Company uses its incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate.

The Company determines its incremental borrowing rate by obtaining interest rates from various external financing sources and makes certain adjustments to reflect the terms of the lease and type of the asset leased.

Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability comprise the following:

- -- fixed payments, including in-substance fixed payments;
- -- variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date;
- -- amounts expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee; and
- -- the exercise price under a purchase option that the Company is reasonably certain to exercise, lease payments in an optional renewal period if the Company is reasonably certain to exercise an extension option, and penalties for early termination of a lease unless the Company is reasonably certain not to terminate early.

The lease liability is measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. It is remeasured when there is a change in future lease payments arising from a change in an index or rate, if there is a change in the Company's estimate of the amount expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee, if the Company changes its assessment of whether it will exercise a purchase, extension or termination option or if there is a revised in-substance fixed lease payment.

When the lease liability is remeasured in this way, a corresponding adjustment is made to the carrying amount of the right- of-use asset, or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

The Company presents right-of-use assets that do not meet the definition of investment property in 'property, plant and equipment' and lease liabilities in 'loans and borrowings' in the statement of financial position.

Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The Company has elected not to recognise right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for leases of low-value assets and short- term leases, including IT equipment. The Company recognises the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(ii) As a lessor

At inception or on modification of a contract that contains a lease component, the Company allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of their relative standalone prices.

When the Company acts as a lessor, it determines at lease inception whether each lease is a finance lease or an operating To classify each lease, the Company makes an overall assessment of whether the lease transfers substantially all of the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of the underlying asset. If this is the case, then the lease is a finance lease; if not, then it is an operating lease. As part of this assessment, the Company considers certain indicators such as whether the lease is for the major part of the economic life of the asset.

When the Company is an intermediate lessor, it accounts for its interests in the head lease and the sub-lease separately. It assesses the lease classification of a sub-lease with reference to the right-of-use asset arising from the head lease, not with reference to the underlying asset. If a head lease is a short-term lease to which the Company applies the exemption described above, then it classifies the sub-lease as an operating lease.

If an arrangement contains lease and non-lease components, then the Company applies IFRS 15 to allocate the consideration in the contract.

The Company applies the derecognition and impairment requirements in IFRS 9 to the net investment in the lease. The Company further regularly reviews estimated unguaranteed residual values used in calculating the gross investment in the lease.

The Company recognises lease payments received under operating leases as income on a straightline basis over the lease term as part of 'other income'.

Generally, the accounting policies applicable to the Company as a lessor in the comparative period were not different from IFRS 16 except for the classification of the sub-lease entered into during current reporting period that resulted in a finance lease classification.

Policy applicable before 1 January 2019

For contracts entered into before 1 January 2019, the Company determined whether the arrangement was or contained a lease based on the assessment of whether:

fulfilment of the arrangement was dependent on the use of a specific asset or assets; and the arrangement had conveyed a right to use the asset. An arrangement conveyed the right to use the asset if one of the following was met:

- the purchaser had the ability or right to operate the asset while obtaining or controlling more than an insignificant amount of the output;
- the purchaser had the ability or right to control physical access to the asset while obtaining or controlling more than an insignificant amount of the output; or
- facts and circumstances indicated that it was remote that other parties would take more than an insignificant amount of the output, and the price per unit was neither fixed per unit of output nor equal to the current market price per unit of output.

(iii) As a lessee

In the comparative period, as a lessee the Company classified leases that transferred substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership as finance leases. When this was the case, the leased assets were measured initially at an amount equal to the lower of their fair value and the present value of the minimum lease payments. Minimum lease payments were the payments over the lease term that the lessee was required to make, excluding any contingent rent. Subsequent to initial recognition, the assets were accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy applicable to that asset.

Assets held under other leases were classified as operating leases and were not recognised in the Company's statement of financial position. Payments made under operating leases were recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received were recognised as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease.

(iv) As a lessor

When the Company acted as a lessor, it determined at lease inception whether each lease was a finance lease or an operating lease.

To classify each lease, the Company made an overall assessment of whether the lease transferred substantially all of the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of the underlying asset. If this was the case, then the lease was a finance lease; if not, then it was an operating lease. As part of this assessment, the Company considered certain indicators such as whether the lease was for the major part of the economic life of the asset

(g) Assets held for sale

Non-current assets, or disposal groups comprising assets and liabilities, are classified as held-forsale if it is highly probable that they will be recovered primarily through sale rather than through continuing use.

Such assets, or disposal groups, are generally measured at the lower of their carrying amount and fair value less costs to sell. Any impairment loss on a disposal group is allocated first to goodwill, and then to the remaining assets and liabilities on a pro rata basis, except that no loss is allocated to inventories, financial assets, deferred tax assets, employee benefit assets, investment property or biological assets, which continue to be measured in accordance with the Company's other accounting policies. Impairment losses on initial classification as held-for-sale or held-fordistribution and subsequent gains and losses on remeasurement are recognised in profit or loss.

Once classified as held-for-sale, intangible assets and property, plant and equipment are no longer amortised or depreciated, and any equity-accounted investee is no longer equity accounted.

(h) Investment properties

Investment property is initially measured at cost and subsequently at fair value with any change therein recognised in profit or loss.

Any gain or loss on disposal of investment property (calculated as the difference between the net proceeds from disposal and the carrying amount of the item) is recognised in profit or loss. When investment property that was previously classified as property, plant and equipment is sold, any related amount included in the revaluation reserve is transferred to retained earnings.

Rental income from investment property is recognised as other revenue on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives granted are recognised as an integral part of the total rental income, over the term of the lease.

(i) Property, plant and equipment

(i) Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost, which includes capitalised borrowing costs, less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

If significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, then they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in profit or loss.

(ii) Subsequent measurement

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Company.

(iii) Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of items of property, plant and equipment less their estimated residual values using a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives. Depreciation is generally recognized in profit or loss.

Land is not depreciated.

(iv) Reclassification to investment property

When the use of a property changes from owner-occupied to investment property, the property is remeasured to fair value and reclassified accordingly. Any gain arising on this remeasurement is recognised in profit or loss to the extent that it reverses a previous impairment loss on the specific property, with any remaining gain recognised in OCI and presented in the revaluation reserve. Any loss is recognised in profit or loss. However, to the extent that an amount is included in the revaluation surplus for that property, the loss is recognised in other comprehensive income and reduces the revaluation surplus within equity.

(j) Intangible assets

(i) Recognition and measurement

Goodwill Goodwill arising on the acquisition of subsidiaries is measured at cost less accumulated

impairment losses.

Research and Expenditure on research activities is recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

development Development expenditure is capitalised only if the expenditure can be measured reliably,

the product or process is technically and commercially feasible, future economic benefits are probable and the Company intends to and has sufficient resources to complete development and to use or sell the asset. Otherwise, it is recognised in profit or loss as incurred. Subsequent to initial recognition, development expenditure is measured at cost

less accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Other intangible

Other intangible assets, including customer relationships, patents and trademarks, that are acquired by the Company and have finite useful lives are measured at cost less

accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses.

(ii) Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the specific asset to which it relates. All other expenditure, including expenditure on internally generated goodwill and brands, is recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

(iii) Amortisation

Amortisation is calculated to write off the cost of intangible assets less their estimated residual values using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives, and is generally recognised in profit or loss. Goodwill is not. The estimated useful lives for current and comparative periods is 3 years. (33.33%) Amortisation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

(k) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are expensed as the related service is provided. A liability is recognised for the amount expected to be paid if the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

(ii) Share-based payment arrangements

The grant-date fair value of equity-settled share-based payment arrangements granted to employees is generally recognised as an expense, with a corresponding increase in equity, over the vesting period of the awards. The amount recognised as an expense is adjusted to reflect the number of awards for which the related service and non-market performance conditions are expected to be met, such that the amount ultimately recognised is based on the number of awards that meet the related service and non-market performance conditions at the vesting date. For share-based payment awards with non-vesting conditions, the grant-date fair value of the share-based payment is measured to reflect such conditions and there is no true-up for differences between expected and actual outcomes.

The fair value of the amount payable to employees in respect of SARs, which are settled in cash, is recognised as an expense with a corresponding increase in liabilities, over the period during which the employees become unconditionally entitled to payment. The liability is remeasured at each reporting date and at settlement date based on the fair value of the SARs. Any changes in the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

(iii) Defined contribution plan

A defined contribution plan is a post-employment benefit plan under which an entity pays fixed contributions into a separate entity and has no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts in respect of all employee benefits relating to employee service in current and prior periods. Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are expensed as the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that a cash refund or a reduction in future payments is available.

The Company operates a funded defined contribution retirement benefit scheme for its employees under the provisions of the Pension Reform Act of 2014. The employer contributes 10% while the employee contributes 8% of the qualifying employee's salary. Obligations in respect of the Company's contributions to the scheme are recognised as an expense in the profit or loss account on an annual basis.

(iv) Defined benefit plans

The Company's net obligation in respect of defined benefit plans is calculated separately for each plan by estimating the amount of future benefit that employees have earned in the current and prior periods, discounting that amount and deducting the fair value of any plan assets.

The calculation of defined benefit obligations is performed annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit credit method. When the calculation results in a potential asset for the Company, the recognised asset is limited to the present value of economic benefits available in the form of any future refunds from the plan or reductions in future contributions to the plan. To calculate the present value of economic benefits, consideration is given to any applicable minimum funding requirements.

Remeasurements of the net defined benefit liability, which comprise actuarial gains and losses, the return on plan assets (excluding interest) and the effect of the asset ceiling (if any, excluding interest), are recognised immediately in OCI. The Company determines the net interest expense (income) on the net defined benefit liability (asset) for the period by applying the discount rate used to measure the defined benefit obligation at the beginning of the annual period to the then-net defined benefit liability (asset), taking into account any changes in the net defined benefit liability (asset) during the period as a result of contributions and benefit payments. Net interest expense and other expenses related to defined benefit plans are recognised in profit an lace.

When the benefits of a plan are changed or when a plan is curtailed, the resulting change in benefit that relates to past service or the gain or loss on curtailment is recognised immediately in profit or loss. The Company recognises gains and losses on the settlement of a defined benefit plan when the settlement occurs.

(v) Other long-term employee benefits

The Company's net obligation in respect of long-term employee benefits is the amount of future benefit that employees have earned in return for their service in the current and prior periods. That benefit is discounted to determine its present value. Remeasurements are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise.

(vi) Termination benefits

Termination benefits are expensed at the earlier of when the Company can no longer withdraw the offer of those benefits and when the Company recognises costs for a restructuring. If benefits are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date, then they are discounted.

(I) Provisions

Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as finance cost.

(m) Contingencies

(i) Contingent liabilities

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or the Company has an a present obligation as a result of past event. It is not recognised because it is not likely that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or the amount cannot be reliably estimated.

Contingent liability is disclosed unless the possibility of an outflow of resources embodying economic benefit is remote. A provision for the part of the obligation for which an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits is probable is recognised, except in the extremely rare circumstances where no reliable estimate can be made.

Contingent liabilities are assessed continually to determine whether an outflow of economic benefit has become probable.

(ii) Contingent assets

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company.

A contingent asset is disclosed when an inflow of economic benefit is probable. When the realization of income is virtually certain, then the related asset is not a contingent and its recognition is appropriate.

Contingent assets are assessed continually to ensure that developments are appropriately reflected in the financial statement.

(iii) Client's assets and liabilities

The Company receive premiums and commissions (cash flows) from the clients on behalf on the underwriter and other joint brokers respectively and vice-versa. The Company's operation of the clients' account is in accordance with Section 41 of the Insurance Act 2013, item 2.3b(3) of 2011 brokers operational guidelines and item 2.3b(6) of 2011 brokers operational guidelines. The Company recognised these cash flows received at cost and are disclosed in the financial statements as payables to the underwriters and/or brokers.

The Company is not expected to hold the funds for more than 30 days before remitting it to the relevant parties based on NAICOM directive.

(n) Share capital

(i) Ordinary shares

Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of ordinary shares are recognised as a deduction from equity. Income tax relating to transaction costs of an equity transaction is accounted for in accordance with IAS 12.

(ii) Share Premium

This represents the excess amount paid by shareholders on the nominal value of the shares. The share premium is classified as an equity instrument in the statement of financial position.

(iii) Preference shares

The Company's redeemable preference shares are classified as financial liabilities, because they bear non-discretionary dividends and are redeemable in cash by the holders. Non-discretionary dividends thereon are recognised as interest expense in profit or loss as accrued.

Non-redeemable preference shares are classified as equity, because they bear discretionary dividends, do not contain any obligations to deliver cash or other financial assets and do not require settlement in a variable number of the Company's equity instruments. Discretionary dividends thereon are recognised as equity distributions on approval by the Company's shareholders.

(iv) Repurchase and reissue of ordinary shares (treasury shares)

When shares recognised as equity are repurchased, the amount of the consideration paid, which includes directly attributable costs, is recognised as a deduction from equity. Repurchased shares are classified as treasury shares and are presented in the treasury share reserve. When treasury shares are sold or reissued subsequently, the amount received is recognised as an increase in equity and the resulting surplus or deficit on the transaction is presented within share premium.

(v) Dividends on ordinary shares

Dividends on ordinary shares are recognised as liabilities in the period when they are declared (ie the dividends are appropriately authorised and no longer at the discretion of the entity) and approved at the Shareholders' Annual General Meeting.

Dividends for the year that are declared after the date of the statement of financial position are disclosed in the subsequent events note.

Dividends proposed but not yet approved are disclosed in the financial statements in accordance with the requirements of the Company and Allied Matters Act.

(o) Compound financial instruments

Compound financial instruments issued by the Company comprise convertible notes denominated in euro that can be converted to ordinary shares at the option of the holder, when the number of shares to be issued is fixed and does not vary with changes in fair value.

The liability component of compound financial instruments is initially recognised at the fair value of a similar liability that does not have an equity conversion option. The equity component is initially recognised at the difference between the fair value of the compound financial instrument as a whole and the fair value of the liability component. Any directly attributable transaction costs are allocated to the liability and equity components in proportion to their initial carrying amounts.

Subsequent to initial recognition, the liability component of a compound financial instrument is measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The equity component of a compound financial instrument is not remeasured.

Interest related to the financial liability is recognised in profit or loss. On conversion at maturity, the financial liability is reclassified to equity and no gain or loss is recognised.

(p) Retained earnings

The retained earnings comprise of undistributed profit/(loss) from previous years and current year. Retained earnings is classified as part of equity in the statement of financial position.

(q) i Revenue

Revenue is recognised at the fair value of consideration received or receivable.

ii Brokerage Commission

Brokerage Commission represents the invoiced value of brokerage services rendered based on agreements with insurance companies, and becomes receivable once the insurance policies are concluded between the insurance company and the policy holder. Income is recognised, net of VAT, as they become earned based on the tenure.

(r) Finance income and finance costs

The Company's finance income and finance costs include:

- -- interest income;
- -- interest expense;
- -- dividend income:
- -- the net gain or loss on the disposal of investments in debt securities measured at FVOCI;
- -- the net gain or loss on financial assets at FVTPL;
- -- the foreign currency gain or loss on financial assets and financial liabilities;
- -- impairment losses (and reversals) on investments in debt securities carried at amortised cost or FVOCI;
- -- the gain on the remeasurement to fair value of any pre-existing interest in an acquiree in a business combination; and
- -- the fair value loss on contingent consideration classified as a financial liability

Interest income or expense is recognised using the effective interest method. Dividend income is recognised in profit or loss on the date on which the Company's right to receive payment is established.

The 'effective interest rate' is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument to:

In calculating interest income and expense, the effective interest rate is applied to the gross carrying amount of the asset (when the asset is not credit-impaired) or to the amortised cost of the liability. However, for financial assets that have become credit-impaired subsequent to initial recognition, interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset. If the asset is no longer credit-impaired, then the calculation of interest income reverts to the gross basis.

(s) Management expenses

Expenses are recognised in profit or loss as they are incurred unless they create an asset from which future economic benefits will flow to the Company. An expected loss on a contract is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

(†) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency of the Company at the on the dates of the transactions.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate at the reporting date. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate when the fair value was determined. Non- monetary items that are measured based on historical cost in a foreign currency are translated at the exchange rate.

However, foreign currency differences arising from the translation of the following items are recognised in OCI:

-- an investment in equity securities designated as at FVOCI (except on impairment, in which case foreign currency differences that have been recognised in OCI are reclassified to profit or loss)

(u) Income tax

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. It is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to a business combination, or items recognised directly in equity or in Other comprehensive income.

The Company has determined that interest and penalties related to income taxes, including uncertain tax treatments, do not meet the definition of income taxes, and therefore accounted for them under IAS 37 Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets.

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SEPARATE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019 (CONT'D)

(i) Current tax

Current tax comprises the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to the tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years. The amount of current tax payable or receivable is the best estimate of the tax amount expected to be paid or received that reflects uncertainty related to income taxes, if any. It is measured using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date. Current tax also includes any tax arising from dividends

Current tax assets and liabilities are offset only if certain criteria are met.

The tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date were as follows:

- -- Company income tax computed on taxable profits;
- -- Tertiary Education tax computed on assessable profits;
- -- National Information Technology Development Agency levy computed on profit before tax; and
- -- Nigeria Police Trust Fund levy computed on net profit (i.e.profit after deducting all expenses and taxes from revenue earned by the company during the year)

Total amount of tax payable under CITA is determined based on the higher of two components namely Company Income Tax (based on taxable income (or loss) for the year); and minimum tax. Taxes based on profit for the period are treated as income tax in line with IAS 12.

Minimum tax

Minimum tax which is based on a gross amount is outside the scope of IAS12 and therefore, are not presented as part of income tax expense in the profit or loss.

Minimum is determined at a rate of 0.5% of the qualifying Company's turnover less franked investment income.

Where the minimum tax charge is higher than the Company Income Tax (CIT), a hybrid tax situation exists. In this situation, the CIT is recognised in the income tax expense line in the profitor loss and the excess amount is presented above the income tax line as minimum tax.

The Company offsets the tax assets arising from withholding tax (WHT) credits and current tax liabilities if, and only if, the entity has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts, and intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. The tax asset is reviewed at each reporting date and written down to the extent that it is no longer probable that future economic benefit would be realised.

(ii) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the amounts used for taxation purposes.

Deferred tax is not recognised for:

- temporary differences on the initial recognition of assets or liabilities in a transaction that is not a business combination and that affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss;
- temporary differences related to investments in subsidiaries, associates and joint arrangements to the extent that the Company is able to control the timing of the reversal of the temporary differences and it is probable that they will not reverse in the foreseeable future; and
- taxable temporary differences arising on the initial recognition of goodwill.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for unused tax losses, unused tax credits and deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which they can be used. Future taxable profits are determined based on the reversal of relevant taxable temporary differences. If the amount of taxable temporary differences is insufficient to recognise a deferred tax asset in full, then future taxable profits, adjusted for reversals of existing temporary differences, are considered, based on the business plans for individual subsidiaries in the Company. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date and are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realised; such reductions are reversed when the probability of future taxable profits improves

Unrecognised deferred tax assets are reassessed at each reporting date and recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will be available against which they can be used.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to be applied to temporary differences when they reverse, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date, and reflects uncertainty related to income taxes, if any.

The measurement of deferred tax reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects, at the reporting date, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities. For this purpose, the carrying amount of investment property measured at fair value is presumed to be recovered through sale, and the Company has not rebutted this presumption.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset only if certain criteria are met.

(v) Earnings per share

The Company presents basic and diluted earnings per share (EPS) data for its ordinary shares. Basic EPS is calculated by dividing the profit or loss that is attributable to ordinary shareholders of the Company by the weighted-average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the period. Diluted EPS are determined by adjusting the profit or loss that is attributable to ordinary shareholders and the weighted-average number of ordinary shares outstanding for the effects of all dilutive potential ordinary shares, which comprise share options granted to employees.

(w) Segment reporting

An operating segment is a component of the Company that engages in business activities from which it may earn revenue and incur expenses, including revenue and expenses that relate to transactions with any of the Company's other components, whose operating results are reviewed regularly by the Company management committee (being the Company's chief operating decision maker) to make decisions about resources allocated to each operating segment and assess performance, and for which discrete financial information is available.

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<u>SEPARATE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS</u> FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019 (CONT'D)

If the Company changes its basis of segment reporting, then comparative segment information is restated so that it aligns with the segment information reported for the current year.

(x) Operating profit

Operating profit is the result generated from the continuing principal revenue-producing activities of the Company as well as other income and expenses related to operating activities. Operating profit excludes net finance costs, share of profit of equity-accounted investees and income taxes.

(y) New standards, amendments and interpretations issued but not yet effective¹

A number of new standards are effective for annual periods beginning after 1 January 2019 and earlier application is permitted; however, the Company has not early adopted the new or amended standards in preparing these financial statements.

The following amended standards and interpretations are not expected to have a significant impact on the Company's

Z Impacts of adopting IFRS 9 and 15

1 IFRS 9 Financial Instruments

IFRS 9 sets out requirements for recognising and measuring financial assets, financial liabilities and some contracts to buy or sell non-financial items. This standard replaces IAS 39 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement.

As a result of the adoption of IFRS 9, the Company has adopted consequential amendments to IAS 1 Presentation of Financial Statements, which require impairment of financial assets to be presented in a separate line item in the statement of profit or loss and OCI. This is how the company currently presents impairment losses in it's statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Impairment losses on other financial assets are presented together with the impairment on trade receivables.

Additionally, the Company has adopted consequential amendments to IFRS 7 Financial Instruments disclosures that are applied to disclosures about 2018 but have not been generally applied to comparative information.

a Transition

Changes in accounting policies resulting from the adoption of IFRS 9 have been applied prospectively as described below.

- -- The company has used an exemption not to restate comparative information for prior periods with respect to classification and measurement (including impairment) requirements. Differences in the carrying amounts of financial assets and financial liabilities resulting from the adoption of IFRS 9 are recognised in retained earnings and reserves as at 1 January 2019. Accordingly, the information presented for 2018 does not generally reflect the requirements of IFRS 9, but rather those of IAS 39.
- --The assessment below have been made on the basis of the facts and circumstances that existed at the date of initial application.
- The determination of the business model within which a financial asset is held.
- The designation of certain investments in equity instruments not held for trading as at FVOCI
- -- If an investment in a debt security had low credit risk at the date of initial application of IFRS 9, then the Company has assumed that the credit risk on the asset had not increased significantly since its initial recognition.

c Classification and measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities

IFRS 9 contains three principal classification categories for financial assets: measured at amortised cost, FVOCI and FVTPL. The classification of financial assets under IFRS 9 is generally based on the business model in which a financial asset is managed and its contractual cash flow characteristics. IFRS 9 eliminates the previous IAS 39 categories of held to maturity, loans and receivables and available for sale financial assets.

IFRS 9 largely retains the existing requirements in IAS 39 for the classification and measurement of financial liabilities. The adoption of IFRS 9 has not had a significant effect on the Company's accounting policies related to financial liabilities.

For an explanation of how the Company classifies and measures financial instruments and accounts for related gains and losses under IFRS 9, see Notes 3, 3a, 3b & 3c.

d Impairment of Financial assets

IFRS 9 replaces the 'incurred loss' model in IAS 39 with an 'expected credit loss' (ECL) model. The new impairment model applies to financial assets measured at amortised cost, contract assets and debt investments at FVOCI, but not to investments in equity instruments. Under IFRS 9, credit losses are recognised earlier than under IAS 39.

For assets in the scope of the IFRS 9 impairment model, impairment losses are generally expected to increase and become more volatile. The Company has determined that the application of IFRS 9's impairment requirements at 1 January 2018 results in an additional allowance for impairment.

The following table and the accompanying notes below explain the original measurement categories under IAS 39 and the new measurement categories under IFRS 9 for each class of the Company's financial assets and financial liabilities as at 1 January 2019 including impairment as a result of transition into IFRS 9.

2 IFRS 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers

Revenue recognition:

The standard contains a single model that applies to contracts with customers and two approaches to recognising revenue: at a point in time or over time. The model features a contract-based five-step analysis of transactions to determine whether, how much and when revenue is recognised.

The core principle of IFRS 15 is that an entity recognises revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration which the entity expects to be entitled to in exchange for those goods and services. The standard incorporates a five step analysis to determine the amount and timing of revenue recognition.

Considering the nature of fees earned by the Company and based on management's assessment, IFRS 15 have a material impact on the Company's financial statements on transition date of 1 January 2019.

The Companies and Allied Matters Act (CAMA) requires that the amount of the company's share capital shall not be less than the authorized minimum share capital.

The Company Management Committee reviews the capital structure of the company regularly to ensure that the company meet up with minimum share capital requirement as may be prescribed by NAICOM from time to time.

The company has complied with the minimum capital requirement specified by National Insurance Commission (NAICOM) as specified in the Acts and guidelines.

17 FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The company's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks:, credit risk, liquidity risk and market risk.

Risk Management is carried out primarily by the Internal Audit and Risk Management department in the company. The department identifies, evaluates and manages financial risk in close cooperation with the company's other department. Written principles for the overall risk management of the company are approved by the Board of Directors.

17.1 Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the company if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations. Credit risk arises from cash and cash equivalent, deposit with banks and other financial institutions, receivables from related parties as well as credit exposures to the company's customers.

The company's financial instrument that are exposed to concentration of credit risk relate primarily to cash receivables from the underwriters and other brokers for commission on premiums. The company's exposure to credit risk is low as the regulation governing insurance brokers business allows for minimum or no credit terms.

17.3 Liquidity risks

Liquidity risk is the risk that the company will encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with the financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset.

The company's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure as far as possible that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stressed conditions without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the company's reputation.

The company aims to maintain the level of cash and cash equivalent at an amount in excess of expected cash outflows on financial liabilities (other than trade payables) over the succeeding 60 days. The company also monitors the level of expected cash inflow on trade & other receivables together with expected cash outflow on trade and payables.

17.4 Market risks

Market risks is the risk that the fair value of future cashflows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market prices comprise those types of risk: Interest rate risk, and currency risk. Financial instrument affected by market risk include, loans and borrowing, deposits, trade receivables, trade payables, accrued liabilities etc.
